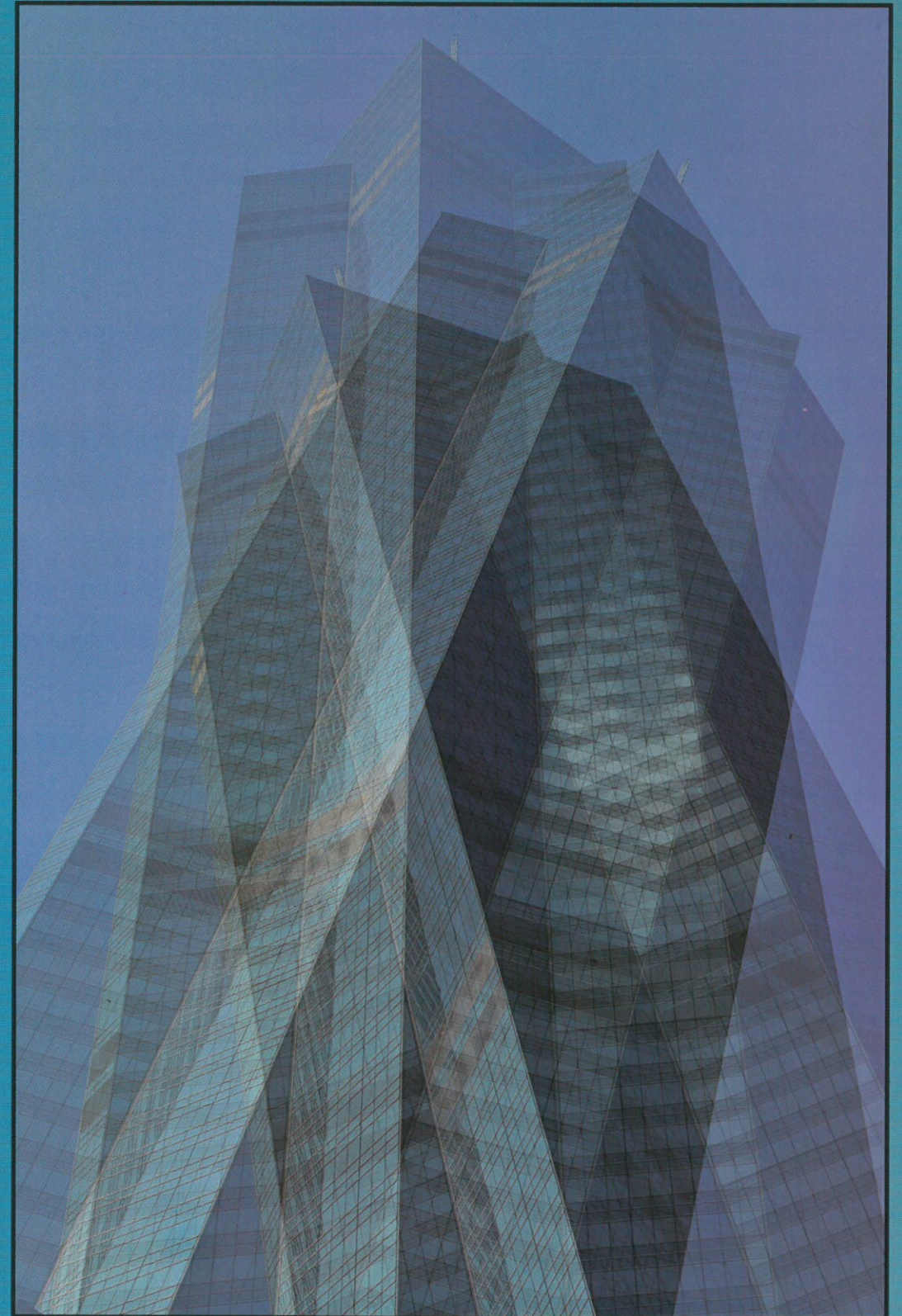
John Fung was prompted to create a series of photographs that vividly illustrates the high density and crowded living conditions in Hong Kong. To compose the narratives, he used multiple exposures and rotated his camera to capture the same scene at different angles. The results are impressions of the sky-high architectural wonders of Hong Kong abstracted into fantastic images of wonder.

John was born in Madagascar and moved to mainland China with his family at the age of thirteen. After receiving his education in Macau, he chose to move to and live in Hong Kong. He has worked many odd jobs in different disciplines—starring in locally made movies, working on construction sites, running restaurants, and making lamps and music speakers. Throughout all this, he always had his camera and continued to do photography. Between 1989 and 2004, he worked for *Next Magazine* and *Ming Pao Weekly Magazine* as photographer and captured some memorable and remarkable images. In 2005, he volunteered his skills to some non-profit making organizations. As part of his charitable works he accepted an invitation by Oxfam Hong Kong to be a volunteer photographer, to visit and provide a visual record of the many of cities that were devastated by the tsunami. John has had four previous exhibitions: “Germs”, “Cocoon”, “Ten Years On” and “On the Road”. He is now a full time artist. ©

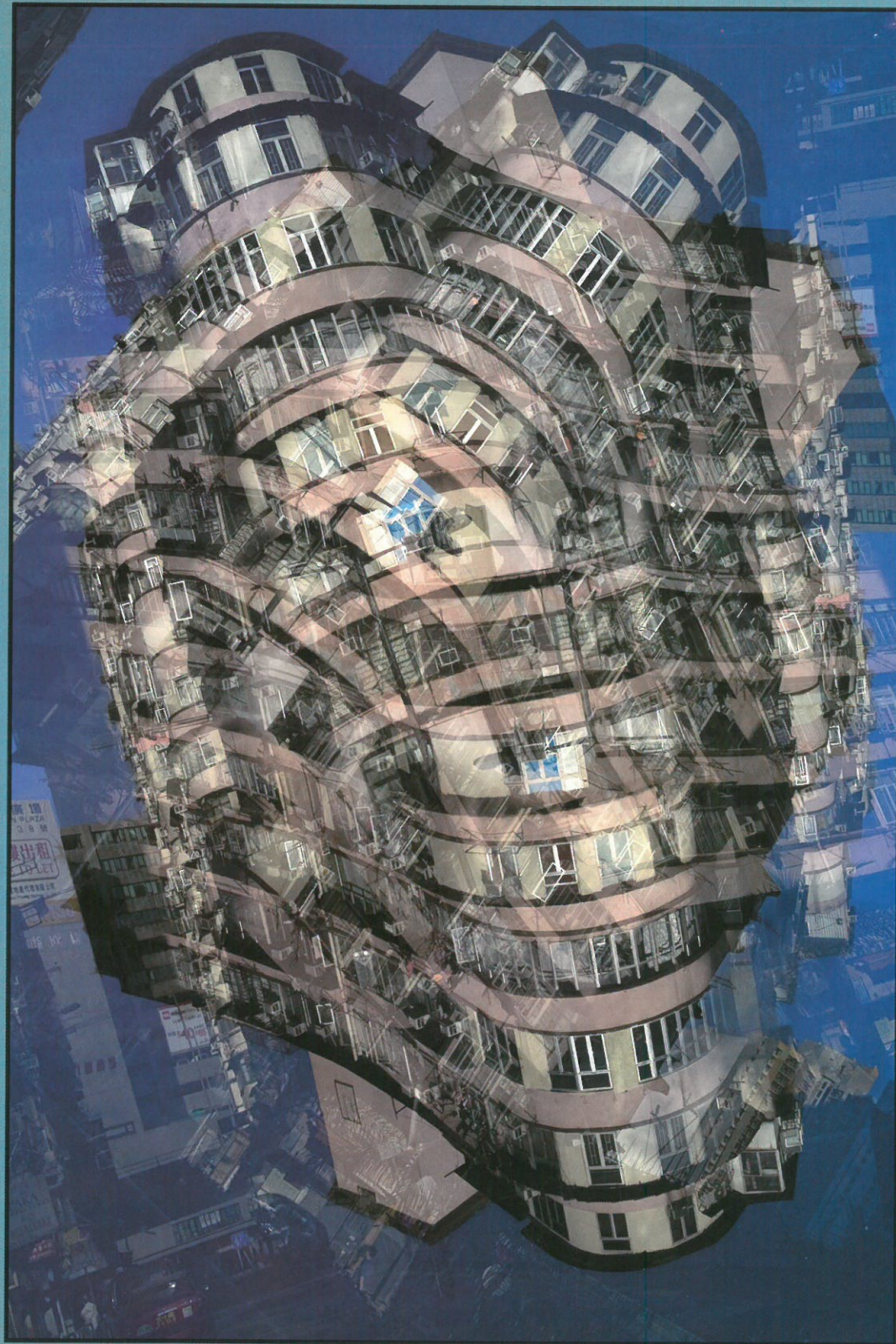

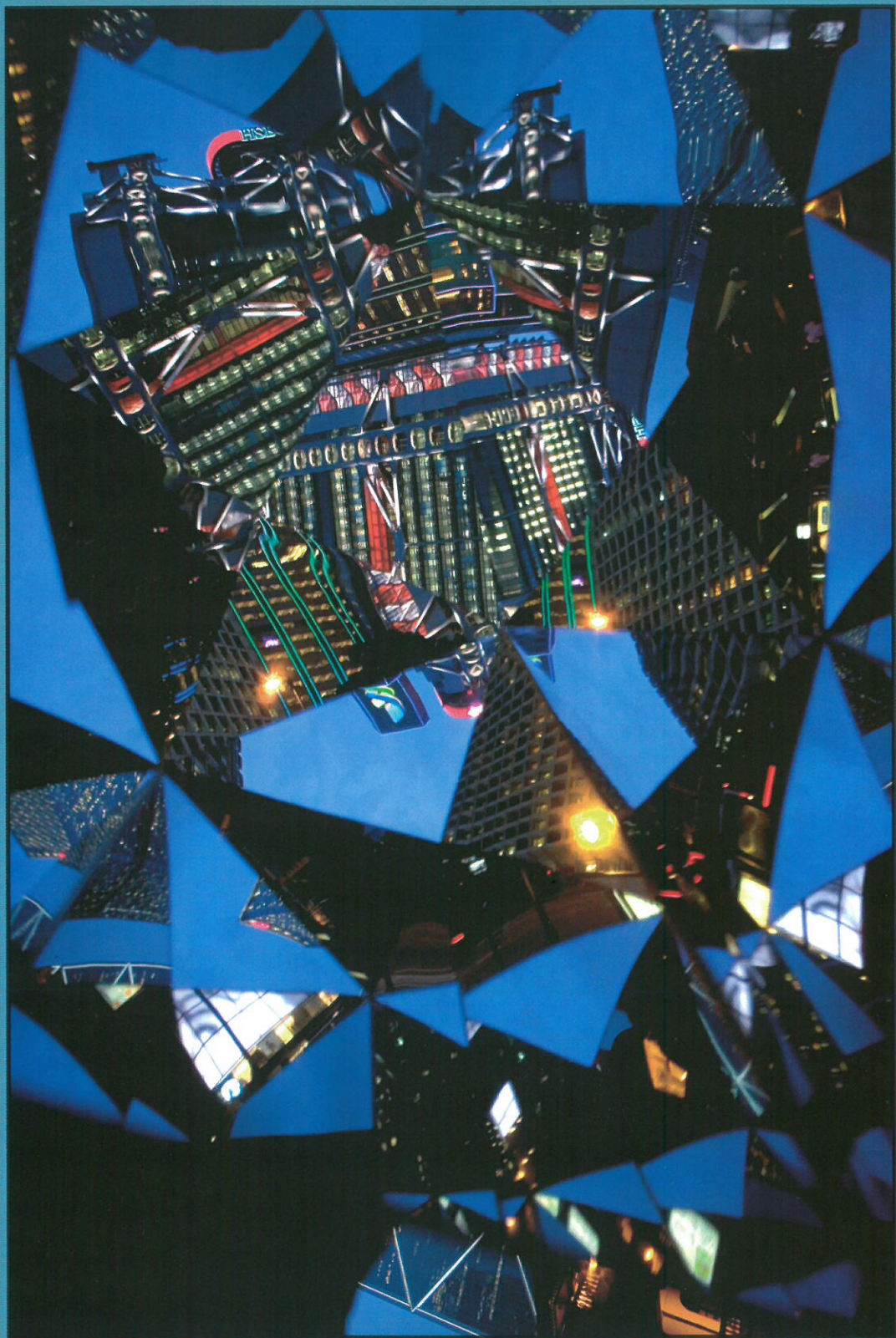

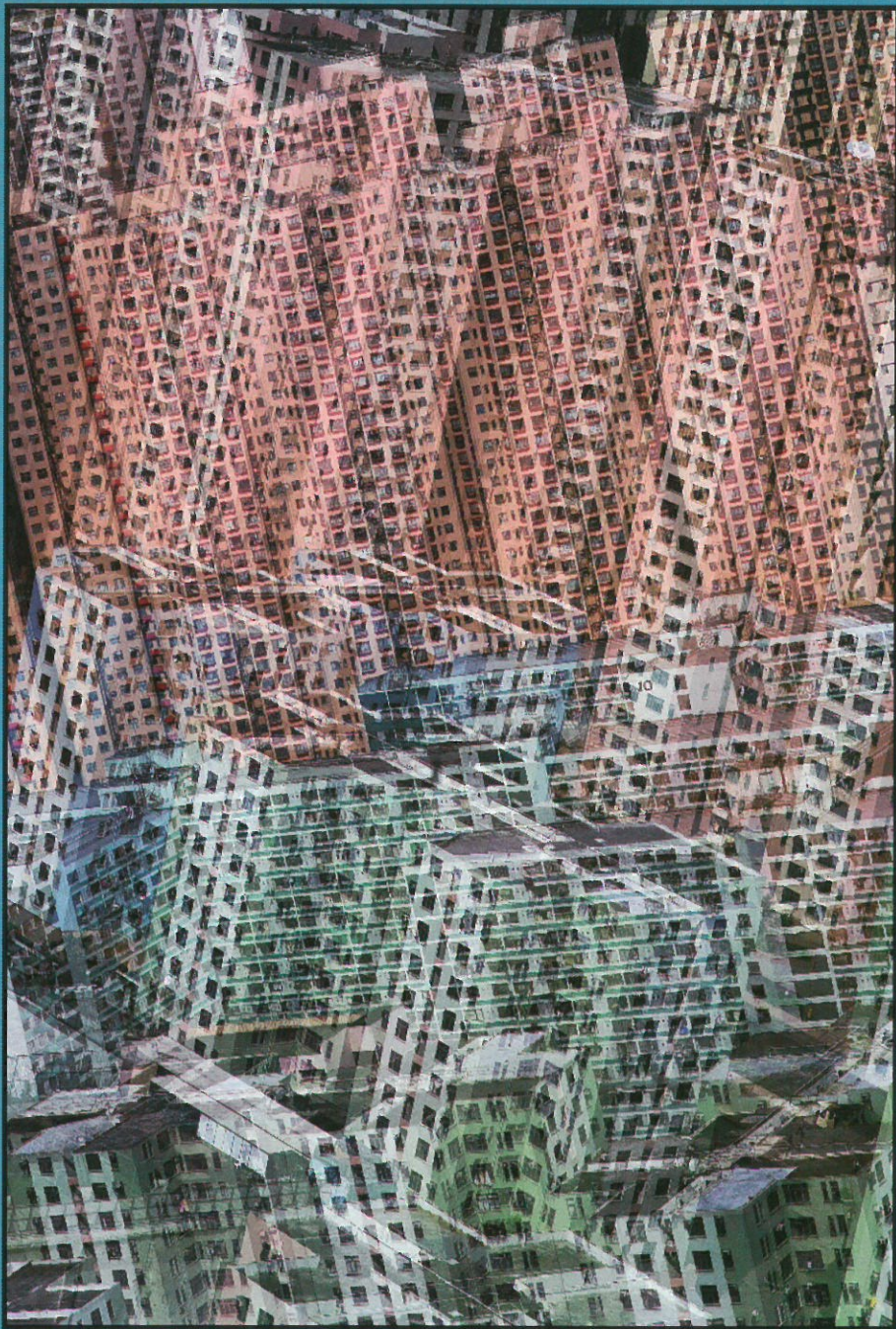
